PLUS! REVISITED

For a couple of years I've meant to revive testing an early Version of PLUS! It's by Jack Sughrue in far away Massachusettes. It had 716 Sectors, 50 files, which skillfully integrated intrinsic TI-99/4A capabilites with utilities and other products of talented programmers. Intrinsics like Tranliterates (.TL); Include File (.IF); and graphics. Utilities like Smallify and Instadump. Products like Calendars, Multi-column, and Labels. Also personalized letterheads.

I bought PLUS! in 1988, figured it had a lot to offer, and gave it to K-Town for Disk of The Month of September. Alas, I never found time to learn to use PLUS! well.

Recently I borrowed one of our Exchange Newsletters to try printing foreign language characters. No luck with that, but by shear chance Jack Sughrue announced his Version 2.0 of PLUS' I had to have it. Now it has 1358 Sectors and 79 files. With Archiver III, on the DSK, Jack packed all this on one DSSD floppy.

I'm going to study this jewel slowly and carefully, to pass on the good things to you. At least that is my good intention.

Principle Purpose of PLUS! -- PLUS! is primarily to help prepare text - The Written Word - in letters, reports, papers, and the like. In this helping process, PLUS! offers TEMPLETS - PATTERNS - MODELS - FORMS - Call them what you will. A templet specifies page form: The margins, the font, the line spacing, etc. A Term Paper Templet for example could produce double space with wide borders; left, right, top, and bottom; the better for the teacher to 'correct,' to 'suggest,' or to flat out 'demand' change! Jack Soughrue is a teacher. A more formal templet would produce more conventional borders.

Another templet allows 134 Condensed characters on each line of text. This could be useful. Yet another specifying Condensed Supersript and reduced line spacing permits 134 columns and 134 lines. This is 18,000 characters on one page equal to almost 12 pages of standard typing! Interesting, but not very useful.

.TLing and .IFing These are short for Transliteration (.TI) and Including file (.IF) Together they are the life blood of PLUS! They are imbeded into specialized templets aleady in PLUS! or one you could personalize for yourself.

Jack Sughrue pushes Trasliteration to the hilt! He uses every letter of the alphabet to tag transliterates which turn on printer functions and to turn them off. Take a squint at just a few in Jack's basic list.

>.TL 1:32,27,52 A / it A lics on >.TL 2:53.32 B / itAlics off

>.TL 6:27,66,3 (or 6:27,15) F / condensed F ine >.TL 7:18 6 / condensed Fine off

>.TL 17:32,27,69 @ / letter @ uality on >.TL 18:27,70,32 R / letter @ uality off

First, note that '32' wherever it appears tells the printer to space once. Jack puts them into the Transliterates in case the typest fails to do so when a Transliterate is used.

Next note that Jack has tagged each turn on Transliterate with a CAPITAL letter which is a prominent letter of the function itself, and to turn off that function the next letter of the alphabet is the tag letter; the better to memorize them.

Thus, to actuate italics printing, type CTRL 'U', SHIFT 'A', CTRL 'U' again. This leaves a distinctive symbol on the monitor which can not be hard copied. The 'A' leaves a tiny 1 with a tiny dot above at about 1 O'clock. Still in italics, actuating condensed font uses the tag letter 'F'. This leaves on the monitor a tiny 6 with a tiny dot above at about 1 O'clock. Turning off italics uses tag letter 'B'. Turning off condensed uses tag letter '6'. So goes the full set of Jack Sughrues uniquely adopted transliterates.

Each .TL carries a number. This I don't yet understand. But it is the ranking in Jack's total list of 27 in all, 'M' being excluded. Letters 'A' through 'V' govern ordinary printer controls. 'W,' 'X,' 'Y,' and 'Z' are reserved for your own specialization. I could make 'Y' print my first name, 808, if I first learned how.

That is a tiny taste of PLUS. Judging from the January Newsletter there likely will be only one more Newsletter. That means I can't possibly explain PLUS! properly by that route. I have too much to learn.

Future of PLUS! In K-Town My only remaining choice is to learn enough to demonstrate PLUS! in February or March or some latter date depending on the fate of K-Town 99er's.

Meantime, I recommend that you see me for a copy. Then, if you like it, send Jack Sughrue \$10.00 BB 1/5/91

(nearly as tough as constantly coming up with new computer newsletter articles.)

Mext thing I know, a little devil is whispering in

my ear, "Why not print up some look-alikes bearing fortunes that are decidedly different in tone and concept and substitute them for the ones you are extracting from the Fortune Cookies?" No sooner whispered, than done! The look-alikes required compressed pitch and fore and aft smiley faces.

The accompanying Tiny Gram will let you get into the act. I had a ball until the family got wise. If your culinary accomplishments include the ability to make Fortune Cookies, here is a great way to perk up those "China Nights". (And keep a starving author alive by sending him some!)

The program will let you input either one line or two line bon mots. For one liners, just press enter in response to the second prompt, Tex will know what to do. Print codes are for an Epson RX-80 printer. (OK for Panasonic KX-P1091 also - Bill)

CHINESE FORTUNE COOKIES Makes about two dozen

1/3 cup all purpose flour 1/8 teaspoon salt

- l Tbsp cornstarch
- 6 Thep sugar
- 4 Thep vegetable oil
- 1 egg white
- 5 Tosp water

1. Sift flour and measure into small bowl. Mix in

sait, cornstarch and sugar.

- 2. Mix oil with egg white and water until blended. Stir into dry ingredients; beat until smooth (about like heavy cream).
- 3. Heat electric griddle or frypan to 300 degrees. Brush surface of griddle with oil. Spoon 1 tablespoon of cookie mixture onto heated griddle. Spread with back of spoon to make 3 inch circle. Repeat with remaining mixture.
- 4. Bake until golden about 5 minutes; turn over and bake 1 minute longer. Remove cookies from griddle one at a time. While still hot and pliable, place fortune in center of cookie. Fold cookie in half; then fold into Fortune Cookie shape by pulling points together and creasing center. (It helps to fold cookies against edge of table.) Place folded cookies in custard or auffin cups to hold shape while they cool.

The above worked fine and several friends really enjoyed the cookies and fortunes (wise remarks). My wife decided that we ought to have the cookies at our next dinner party and I wanted to take some to the next K-TOMN meeting. It took me about 2 hours or more to find enough proverbs (looked in old Reader's Digest magazines) and to type them in using the above program. Decided that there must be some way to keep from redoing all that typing every time by using Funnelmeb. The text was no problem. The smiley was. Then I remembered the graphics (61,62,63) of the PLUS! program. Did a little research and came up with the following:

(I saved this (using Editor of FW) as DSKn.54 on the same disk with the proverbs and the recipe.)
.TL 23:27.15 (CONDENSED print on)

.TL 24:27,75,12,0,60,66,63,137,165,133,133,165,137,66,66,60 (Prints sailey face)

ob,ov (Prints salley face)
.TL 25:18 (CONDENSED print off)

On line 0001 of your text (proverb) file type: .IF DSKn.64

Next line press CTRL U/Shift W/CTRL U (for condensed print)

At the beginning and end of each proverb press CTRL U/SHIFT X/CTRL U for a smiley face. On your very last line press CTRL U/SHIFT Y/CTRL U to turn condensed print off. As you'll notice below, the smiley face is slightly larger then the one shown above using the Tiny Gram program.

About a week after I had typed in the above, my mife found another Chinese Fortune Cookie recipe in a Rotter Homes and Gardens Griental Cook Book. Though the ingredients are the same, the proportions are slightly different. Personally, I like the below recipe better because the cookies don't seem as greasy. However, my

wife likes the taste using the above recipe better. So, you may have to try both recipes to see which satisfies your taste bud best. Follow the same instructions above. One note for either recipe - if your griddle or frypan has a non-stick surface, you will not need to brush surface with oil (see instruction 3 above).

CHINESE FORTUNE COOKIES RECIPE #2 Makes 8 cookies

1/4 cup sifted cake flour

- 2 tbsp sugar
- 1 tbsp cornstarsh
- dash salt
- 2 thep cooking oil
- 1 egg white
- 1 tbsp water

IT WAS ALL IN THE BOFTWARE

At our December meeting, and in the January Newsletter I reported an alleged disaster with my computer. In my haste to have a system operational for the December Meeting I hauled out my backup system and hurriedly exchanged cards in the PE Box in a futile process of elimination.

I finally put an operational system together but it had only one disk drive. Knowing that we often copy disks at our meetings I resolved that it was quicker to substitute the Group System in place of my System than it would be to try to get annother disk drive into operation.

The ramdisk was delivered to me with a version of ROS loaded but by use of the untra metry required that I reload the ROS and marrition and ramdisk into four seperate moves. Make my start and dismay as soon as I loaded the ROS I was back to square one. The screen went blank, an alarming sound was emitted from the monitor and the computer locked up. I concluded in haste that Bud had done nothing to repair the alleged bad ramdisk.

Everthing was working fine. Just like it was supposed to be.

In summation, the only thing that was damaged in the origional disaster was a disk that was in drive 3. What contaminated my Gram Kracker and the disk containing the ROS in drive one remains a mystery.

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
